第一部分 解题技巧

第一节 完形 (Section I Use of Language)

"完形"小秘诀:一研主干找准位置 二断词性有的放矢 三看固搭或是句法

- 一、词义辨析(包括动词、名词、介词、连词、形容词、副词等辨析)
- 1.默记口诀:心中熟记五"堡垒",迅速判断归哪类,一主一谓是必备,主谓均在则排位。

五堡垒即五种简单句的基本句型,英语句子必须含有的是主语和谓语。主语谓语都不缺,就要排排其他位置了。

2.默记口诀:形介修名副动谓,连于句间状整配。对题细问空何位?

形容词、介词可用来修饰名词,副词用来修饰谓语动词,连词要用在两句之间,状语常用来修饰整个句子。

- 二、推理判断(包括对常识的判断、对逻辑思维的判断等)
- 1.默记口诀: 客观真理要牢记,需知天文和地理,如觉违背世真理,思虑再三再下笔。

读文定要有逻辑,是肯是否需统一,前后切莫把题戏,做题需稳莫佛系。

有些题是客观真理,根据常识就可判断出。如果觉得与真理相悖,一定要思索再三。

所有文章都是有一定的逻辑的,所以不管是肯定的观点还是否定的观点,文章表达的观点前后应该是 一致的,做题的时候要心细,切不可佛系看题儿戏做题。


